# All About Bees

In Australia bees are thought of honey producers for human consumption, although their prime purpose is to pollinate the flowers to produce seeds to ensure plants for our food supply. The bee count has improved in our garden from single to multi digits over the last 6 to 7 years. Helped along by allowing herbs to flower.

Flowering parsley heads buzz with activity as does the pretty four petal yellow flowers on wild rocket. Dill, coriander and basil, while not as attractive also play their part.

Two herbs which flower well are the beautiful blue borage and the stately pink echinacea with the honey pot shaped cone heads. Both are an attractive addition to any garden, especially your vegetable plot to encourage the bees to this area. Allowing herbs to flower to become pollinated has the added advantage of self sown plants ready to be thinned out For gardeners not interested in growing herbs the salvia family are powerful bee attractors. **Pat Powell** 

# Give Plants a Boost with Boron

BORON, also known as borax, is one of the most important race elements required by plants.

It's main function is to increase plants' cell wall growth and strength but it is also particularly important in fruit development and in the movement of calcium into and around your plants. Boron is also important for the growing parts of your plants, such as the root tips and the new leaves and buds. Boron can increase the flowers, germination and fruit development.

Signs of boron deficiency include tips of plants that look to be stunted, twisted and/or distorted with multiple branching, plants that have short fat roots and yellow veins on young leaves and flowers and fruit that are dropping off early before they are ready.

There can be different symptoms for different plants. In citrus, the seeds may be dried up and the fruit may develop a brown disclouration on their skin, while cauliflowers may get a brown top. Long dry periods can make your garden boron deficient, as can an overdose of lime on your garden.

So a little bit of boron mixed with water and used as a foliar spray can do wonders for your plants.

Follow the directions carefully as an overdose can be toxic to your plants.

After you use it a couple of times you should see a difference and then you may not have to use it again for a year or so.

But from now on, by following this simple procedure of freezing the whole lemon, then grating it on top of your dishes, you can consume all of those nutrients and get even healthier.

It's also good that lemon peels are health rejuvenators in eradicating toxic elements in the body.

So place your washed lemon in your freezer, and then grate it on your meal every day. It is a key to make your foods tastier and you get to live healthier and longer! That's the lemon secret! Better late than never, right? The surprising benefits of lemon!

# 1925

In his April Budget the Chancellor of the Exchequer, Winston Churchill, announces the return of the gold standard. The standard is thought to signify monetary stability. Churchill also reduces income tax by sixpence and introduces a new national pension scheme.

On March 13th the Summer Time Bill gains Parliamentary approval and British Summer Time becomes a permanent fixture on the calendar.
